MINUTES OF THE STATE ETHICS COMMISSION MEETING

December 21, 2017

The meeting convened at 9:34 a.m. at the Commission's offices in Annapolis. Those listed as present participated in all portions of the meeting unless otherwise noted. If other individuals participated in aspects of the meeting, they will be identified in the specific line item where their participation occurred.

ITEM 1: Tentative Agenda

Discussion: The Commission reviewed the tentative agenda.

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord presented a listing of the proposed additions and deletions to the financial disclosure list recommended by State agencies and reviewed by him. The recommendations covered the Office of Administrative Hearings, Department of Aging, Department of Information Technology, Department of Juvenile Services, Department of Labor, Licensing & Regulation, Department of Transportation, Motor Vehicle Administration, University of Maryland-Baltimore, University of Maryland University College, Anne Arundel Community College, Garrett College, Montgomery College, Morgan State University, Department of Human Services, Workers' Compensation Commission and the Department of Natural Resources. Several positions from the Department of Natural Resources were discussed in detail.

<u>Discussion:</u> Ms. Thompson briefed the Commission on a financial interest and secondary employment request regarding a nurse in the Department of Health whose spouse's new business is regulated by the Department.

<u>Decision:</u> The Commission granted an exception to allow the financial interest and secondary employment.

<u>ITEM 30:</u> Informal Matter – Maryland Stadium Authority (17-0502)

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord briefed the Commission on the Maryland Stadium's Authority proposed policy governing affiliated foundations as it relates to conflicts of interest, which legislation enacted during the 2017 Legislative Session requires the Commission to review and approve.

<u>Decision:</u> The Commission approved the conflict of interest provisions in Maryland Stadium Authority's policy.

ITEM 31: Executive Director's Report – Regulation Changes

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord briefed the Commission on the status of the recently-approved regulation changes, noting they have been published in the Maryland Register and are now in effect.

<u>ITEM 32:</u> Executive Director's Report – Citizens' Group in Carroll County

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord briefed the Commission on the efforts of VOCAL, a grassroots organization in Carroll County that has been working to encourage the County Council to adopt a county ethics law that complies with the Public Ethics Law.

ITEM 33: Executive Director's Report – 2018 Legislative Session

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord informed the Commission that the 2018 Legislative Session will begin on January 10 and he advised he will reach out to the Commission members to establish a Commission position on any bills that could have a substantive impact on the Public Ethics Law.

ITEM 34: Executive Director's Report – On-line training upgrade

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord briefed the Commission on the status of efforts to develop an RFP to solicit bids to upgrade the Commission's on-line training programs. As a result of recent legislation that mandated certain changes to the Commission's electronic financial disclosure filing system, much of the money that was budgeted for the training upgrade is being diverted to satisfy the requirements of the legislation. Staff is meeting with representatives of the University System next month to discuss the possibility of a partnership to obtain the needed training upgrades.

<u>ITEM 35:</u> Executive Director's Report – Financial Disclosure and Lobbyist Registration systems

<u>Discussion:</u> Mr. Lord briefed the Commission on issues with the platform used to support the financial disclosure and lobbyist registration systems. Both the Commission's contractor and DoIT officials concur the software is old and will at some point become obsolete – the contractor is already having difficulty finding programmers to work on it. As a result, staff has requested funds to replace the software and is seeking assistance from DoIT to put together an RFP.
